

## SACRAMENT INFORMATION

Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated on the second Sunday of each month at 12:30 P.M. or during the 11:30 A.M. Mass. Arrangements for all Baptisms must be made in advance by contacting the parish office at 732-938-5375. Prior to scheduling the baptism of your child, sponsor letters, donation, and attendance at a **Baptism Preparation Class** is mandatory for parents. Godparents/ sponsors are also encouraged to attend. Classes are held in Classroom 10 at 7:30 P.M. on the last Monday of each month. To sign up, you must fill out the registration form on our website for the date you wish to attend.

**Sacrament of Marriage**: Contact the parish office to begin marriage preparation at least one year before the anticipated wedding date.

**The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick** is available as needed, by calling the Pastor's Office at 732-938-5375 OPT. 7

**Recommendation for Sponsorship:** In order to be a godparent/sponsor for Baptism or Confirmation, a person must have received all their Sacraments through Confirmation; be at least 16 years of age; if married, be married in the Catholic Church; attend Mass faithfully (showing attendance through the use of your church envelopes or the welcome envelopes located in the narthex); be a registered, actively participating parishioner for a minimum of six (6) months. Please stop by the Parish Office to fill out a form to be recommended for sponsorship. All requests will be seen by the Pastor and you will be notified when your form is ready.

# **PASTOR'S MESSAGE**

Dear Parishioners,

Today is the Tenth Sunday of Ordinary Time.

Let me share with you an interesting but a tragic story. There is a village in Wales which is called Beddgelert, which literally means the burial place of Gelert. The wonderful heir of this estate was a dog. Historical tradition says that a 13<sup>th</sup> century prince called Llewellyn was given the hound by his hated lord, King John of England. One day Llewellyn returned home to find his baby's cradle overturned and the baby gone. As the dog ran up to greet him, Llewellyn noticed that its muzzle was smeared with blood. Thinking that the dog had savaged his child, Llewellyn drew his sword and killed it right away. Then, suddenly, from beneath the cradle, came a cry. There was the baby unharmed and next to him, the lifeless body of a wolf. The dog had courageously defended his master's beloved child from the wolf's attack.

Obviously, Llewellyn had misjudged the dog, coming to conclusions before knowing the facts and the truth. Prejudice blinded him to the possibility of goodness. He buried the dog with honor, but the dying whimpers of that loyal hound stayed with Llewellyn. The story says that Llewellyn never smiled again, sickened, that in the act of heroic love he could only perceive madness and evil.

In the Gospel today, some people mistakenly saw madness and evil in Jesus. Comparatively speaking, he was not like other healers who used potions and incantations to make people better. As we can see, Jesus lifted people from their crippling sense of worthlessness with a touch. He was not like the religious teachers of His day who were so preoccupied with ritual correctness. Jesus taught that goodness and kindness pleased God most. He felt warmth towards men and women who were honest about themselves and recognized that they needed help. In reading the Gospel it is quite ironic that the ones who failed to recognize goodness when they saw it were the religious experts. What they did not understand, they discredited. And since Jesus did not fit so well with their conventional idea of what a holy man should be, they assumed he must be doing Satan's work.

Unfortunately, we live in a time when the difference between good and evil seems less clear than ever before. Where honestly and selflessness are viewed as something weak or foolish, then even people of faith may convince themselves that right is wrong, and that wrongdoing is nothing to worry about since everyone else bends the rules. Sadly, there may come a time when like the scribes, we can no longer recognize God's presence in our world, nor understand how much we need healing, mercy and forgiveness.

Allow me to conclude my reflection with an experience of a catechist, who once was teaching 4<sup>th</sup> graders about the "brightness of their souls in the state of grace, but also was warning them that sins create "dark spots" on those same souls, even to the point of gradually blackening them. So, at the wrapping up of the lesson, he asked the class what they imagined were the state of their souls. After a long silence, a little girl adamantly answered: "I think my soul is kind of stripey."

Luckily, however "stripey" our souls may be, for those of us fortunate enough to know Jesus and his Gospel message, we always have hope of forgiveness and redemption. No one is beyond mercy, but to receive God's forgiveness, first we must want it. So, it is that we come before God, understanding how much in need we are of God's compassion. With all humility, let us join the crowd who gathered at the home of Jesus in Capernaum, imperfect people like ourselves who have the strong desire to live in a way that is more pleasing to God. Be mindful that Jesus' family are all those who live in a way that pleases God. Amen.
