

FROM THE DESK OF THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners.

As I write this article, the weather has changed along with the grounds and plants, etc. Obviously, the Fall season is here as we continue to experience personally and as a community, the public health crisis, COVID-19 pandemic. Please be reminded that the Bishop has given the dispensation of not attending Sunday Liturgies, and we discourage our parishioners, especially those with a high-risk medical condition, not to come to Church and make use of the many live stream Masses on the internet. Let us continue to be wearing mask/face covering, observe social distancing, constantly wash our hands as we do our due diligence on cleaning, disinfect, and sanitize our church and the office complex. The virus is deadly. It is airborne and spreads that way. At this time, we are not allowed to have non-liturgical events in our building. Coming to Church for the Mass is essential. However, we must let you know that we not only care for your spiritual health but bodily health as well. Kindly follow our guidelines and protocols as mandated by the diocese and the government. We strongly need your cooperation and support as we do our best to handle and manage this crisis as God's faithful people.

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

This Sunday is the beginning of the Year of Grace, 2021. We start with the new calendar year; hence our readings are from the Lectionary Year B, Sunday cycle, and Cycle 1: Weekday in Ordinary Time. In one of my vacations, I had the opportunity to attend Church. The preacher shared an interesting story about a mother imprisoned in a garden shed along with her young son, Donald. The boy had always lived in the shed and has experienced the outside world only through a small skylight and on a TV screen. When his mother tells him that there is a wonderful world outside the shed, he does not believe her. He feels safe in the confined space of the room and is afraid of change. But finally, the boy escapes and finds out how beautiful and immense the larger world is.

We wonder what is the main point of this image is to us? We want to help you understand what Advent all is about. Simply, it is the coming of Christ. All too often, Advent is oftentimes captured and imprisoned in the world of shopping and commercial build-up to Christmas. Christmas carols, office gatherings, etc., are nice as they anticipate the feast but do not provide any space and room to prepare the real significance of the coming of the Baby Infant of Mary in Bethlehem, Judea. Therefore, every year, on the first Sunday of Advent, the Church calls us out of the myopic, protected world, where we are hesitant to change into the larger, vast world of God's coming to us.

Listening carefully to the readings for this Sunday, we are reminded that the child in the manger will not just be another Christmas baby, but the Word made flesh. He is the Son of God, creator of the world, who has humbled himself to be human like us. And he is the Son of man who will come in glory on the clouds of heaven to call the whole of his creation to account. The issue is we miss the whole point because we prefer to slumber. Like Israel before us, we prefer to stay in our comfort zone, live with our sins, and hope that God will get off our backs and go away.

At this point, we hear the voice of Isaiah, the great prophet of Advent. For in Advent, we relive the Old Testament's prophecies as they point forward to the coming of the promised Messiah. Isaiah is the most eloquent of these voices. He tells us that the worst possible thing for us is for God to leave us alone. When we are left alone, we wander around lost, and our hearts harden. So, the big question now is how we can prepare for the coming of Christ at Christmas? First, let us place him in the proper perspective of his final coming as judge and savior. Secondly, by being alert, like the servant in the Gospel we read today who waits for his master's return, not knowing when he will come back.

Being alert also means that we must be ready for the risen Christ to come to us now. St. Paul says', "you will not be without any of the gifts of the Spirit while you are waiting for our Lord Jesus Christ to be revealed." The Spirit makes Christ present in the sacraments, comes to free us, and helps us to recognize the sins that blind us to the demands of God's justice in our lives. Advent is time for the Sacrament of Reconciliation; Let us open our hearts as we are ready to meet Jesus at Christmas. Christ comes to us in the Mass through his word and his real presence in his body and blood. We ask him to make us ready for his coming at Christmas. As we celebrate Advent, and we pray for the courage to be transformed, to give more room for God in our lives, and be alert and ready for Christ's glorious coming in our lives. Amen.





GOSPEL READING


Jesus instructs his disciples to be vigilant for the end times. How can you make this spiritual discipline a focus of your Advent season this year? Prayer for the Faithful Departed



What is the story behind the Advent wreath?

Each season in the liturgical calendar comes with its own local and regional rituals. During the Advent season, wreathes adorn church sanctuaries and family dining room tables. You may have said Advent wreath prayers in childhood or taken a turn lighting the candles. The Advent wreath is full of symbolism about Christ and his coming at Christmas. The wreath is made of evergreen boughs, reminding us that the life of grace does not falter with the changing seasons. It always remains fresh and new. Similarly, a circular wreath reminds us of the eternal, never-ending nature of God's love.

Candles remind us that Christ is the light of the world, the One who "shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." We use four candles to represent each week of Advent. Traditionally they come in the liturgical colors of the season. Purple has historically represented penance and sacrifice. We see the same color for the season of Lent. On the third Sunday of Advent, however, we light a rose color. The priest will wear rose vestments at Mass. This is Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete means "rejoice" in Latin. On the third Sunday of Advent, we are roughly halfway through the season. The Church chooses the midpoint to remind us to celebrate in the midst of our anticipation! Whatever the color and whatever the day, the Advent wreath is a beautiful practice to focus our attention on Christ's coming at Christmas.
