FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

One of the most relevant subjects today is whether a priest/clergy can endorse or suggest candidates to be elected. Pope Francis has said, "teach your people discernment by you stepping back from the sheer politics of it. Try to step back and say "here are the major moral issues that we face," "that is what is most important." As the Bishop has said, that advice is consistent with the Catholic Church's Code of Canon Law and the Church practice in the United States. Bishops and ordained clergy clearly have the right to their own personal opinions in political matters and a right to express them. Nevertheless, they should not preach their opinion from the pulpit or any other official forum. They should refrain from taking an active part in political parties, including the public endorsement of candidates for political office.

Once again, the question, what is the role of the ordained clergy during this election period? Bishops and ordained clergy as their collaborators participate in the three-fold mission of the Catholic Church "to teach, govern and sanctify" the People of God. Insofar as political matters or issues concerning aspects of faith, morals, and the common good, bishops and clergy have a proper responsibility to exercise their teaching office regarding both in the Church and the public square. Consequently, American Catholic Citizens such as bishops, ordained clergy, and lay faithful are called to vote conscientiously because we are people of faith. Since bishops and ordained clergy participate in the Church's teaching office, it is their proper role to help Catholics develop their consciences and understand what the Church teaches in faith, morals, and the common good that they can make decisions in line with their Catholic faith.

THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Today's Gospel is a profound reminder for all of us as Jesus says the greatest commandment is twofold: love of God and love of neighbor. We are all reminded that our forefathers, ancestors, and everybody else were once strangers in a foreign land and must show justice and compassion to vulnerable people. They are the poor, strangers, disadvantaged. The generous love of neighbor is an indispensable means of loving God. As we hear it in the Gospels, Jesus expands the meaning of neighbor: the commandment of love includes those in our family and our community, along with the older people, orphans, outsiders, impoverished people around the world, and even our enemies. In other words, our Lord Jesus means everyone. The authenticity of our faith, our love of God, and our relationship with Christ are measured by the way we treat others. The readings challenge us to seek repentance and forgiveness for our negative attitudes towards others. The second reading suggests that we should abandon idols, perhaps the love of money, consumerism, celebrities, etc. and make a conscious choice to love our neighbors. An excellent example to emulate would be the saints. They expressed their love for God by seeking out the most wretched, the poorest, weakest society members, loving them, and raising them, revealing their dignity as persons worthy of love.

The question now and concretely, how do we apply the law of love in our lives? What does it mean to love our neighbor in the world today? Can we enlarge and broaden our understanding and concept of neighbor to include the wider world, particularly where basic needs are so great? The love that Jesus is talking about is more than warm feelings towards others. Charity is incredibly vital in our world, but it goes alongside speaking and acting on others' behalf. It means living simply, sharing our wealth, protecting our environment, caring for others by following the directives and protocols of the government and the Church during this unprecedented time, and investing our money ethically so as not to exploit and take advantage of others.

As it is proven and our experience would tell us that Churches more than ever are a valuable resource to vulnerable people such as those who are homeless, migrants, or refugees. Some churches provide facilities for an overnight stay in the winter months. Some have arrangements with local authorities or businesses to provide food and coffee or tea vouchers at local vendors. Some churches are in ecumenical networks running soup kitchens, health support, and asylum seeker support services. Participants often say how they have learned from the engagement, and their understanding of "neighbor" has expanded. We are stewards of one another, and we are called to seek to love and pray for friends and enemies alike. A mission for waging peace over waging war at the international level is also vital. Keep in mind that in God's kingdom, even enemies are treated as friends. Amen.



It is through the sacraments they confer that we encounter the divine in a real and profound way.


May your church never lose sight of these, your special sons, and may we, the body of Christ,

What Happens To People As They Age?




As people age, the way their senses (vision, taste, smell, hearing and touch) give them information about the world changes.
