FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

We are glad to share with you that even if we are at this most challenging time, St. Catherine's parish community is healthy and vibrant as we continue serving and ministering to the faithful people. To mention a few of them, we are back to our original schedule of all the Masses, including the Sunday liturgies. For the past two Sundays, our participation and attendance are quite encouraging. We have seen the familiar faces of our devoted people in those schedules convenient for them. When we have conversations with them, it's apparent that they miss the Church, the fellowship, and the friendship. They show their due respect to the protocols and directives mandated by the government and by the diocese. They understand that we are in the midst of a public health crisis, and therefore we have to be smart as we stay safe and healthy. We believe that we can beat this pandemic by our cooperation and adherence to the guidelines.

Another sacrament that we are regularly doing nowadays would be administering the first sacrament, the Sacrament of Baptism. Since the Bishop has given us permission to administer the sacraments, of course, observing the proper restrictions and guidelines, there has been a good number of children that we were able to baptize. And due to its great need, we administer the sacrament during the weekend, Saturdays and Sundays. Considering the number of months that we were closed, we had some backlogged, and moving forward, we will accommodate all the requests for this beautiful sacrament.

As we have announced, Bishop O'Connell has given the delegation to his pastors to administer the Sacrament of Confirmation during these challenging times. We are happy to share with everybody that we are close to completing the Sacrament of Confirmation for the eighth graders within our Religious Education Program. Though we have completed several ceremonies to comply with social distancing, we did it solemnly with the support and assistance of our team. They are such a blessing to the parish. We cannot thank them enough for their help. Thank you very much.

TWENTY-SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

St. Paul, on his way to Damascus, the Pharisee who is so zealous, met the risen and crucified Christ. He had to make a choice, either the Jewish law or the risen Lord. Paul was overwhelmed by God's grace and turned to Christ. He had to rethink all his views. He understood now that the God who had freed Moses from slavery to Egypt and brought the Jews out of their prison of exile had gone even further and been willing in Jesus, God's Son, to suffer the degrading death of the cross. That is why it changed Paul's mind that God could reveal his unfathomable love.

Instead of being ashamed of the cross, he puts it in the center of his Gospel. When Paul writes to his faithful community at Philippi's city in today's 2nd reading, he wants to touch their hearts to make them more loving to each other. The question is, how can he change them? Paul recites a beautiful hymn, which tells the story of Jesus' divine love, how Jesus did not cling to his status as divine Son, but in the incarnation humbly took on our human condition and was willing to face death. And not just any other death but the excruciating, terrible punishment meted out to slaves that is crucifixion. Jesus experiences excessively the depths of human suffering. His father answered his prayer by raising him to eternal life so that the whole of creation recognized him as Lord. Paul admonished his congregation to steep themselves in this story so that this divine love touches their hearts, and they imitate Jesus.

We have to realize that our society was based on Christian values, although many people do not recognize it. That prized beliefs as the equal intrinsic worth of all human beings and the person's inherent dignity depend on a crucified and risen Christ. St. Paul drew out the implications of such divine love for his congregation. God showed compassion for outcasts; poor people were closer to God than those who were rich: "the last will be first, and the first, last." It is not surprising that in today's Gospel, the tax collectors and the prostitutes are drawn by Christ's strange love before the religious leaders. We have to rediscover the scandal and power of the cross and try to have the mind of Christ. Amen.
