FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

Some of my friends asked me, "Father, I wonder what's going on in this world, most especially in our own country? We still have this public health crisis, the COVID-19 pandemic, and devastating natural calamities are happening, like wildfires up north, hurricane, and heavy storms down south, even in our state and county, we are greatly affected. Not to mention those people who are afflicted with different diseases, unemployment problems, etc. Honestly, I responded to those questions with a simple smile and said I have no idea. However, at this unprecedented time, it is but typical to find a way on how to deal with what is going on, no matter how bad they are. Keep on searching, talk to people, listen, and never stop praying. Face the challenge. Never give up. And above all, keep the faith.

My friends, allow me to share some ideas, insights, and reflections I found as I continue to look for answers for some of these questions. Once there was a miserable looking man who went to the flower shop to get some flowers. The florist asked: "For what occasion, sir? The man responded, "for my wedding anniversary." The florist continued, "but why do you look unhappy?" "It was yesterday," the man replied with deep regrets in his eyes.

Jesus, time and again, warns us of the biggest sorrow, misery, and regrets at the conclusion of our lives: "What profit would there be for one to gain the whole world and forfeit his life?" The reality is, when we leave this world, we may regret that we loved the Lord God and his good people too little, too late because we were so in love with our selves.

This time of uncertainty due to the worldwide health crisis has taught us many things: life is so short and fragile. And we hope that it has taught us what is really of great importance in our lives. Let me give you a list of horizon shifts as we recommend refocusing our minds and what we must do.

- Focus on your Creator, not on creatures, including yourself. Live for something or someone greater than yourself and your loved ones.
 Keep in mind that we are all on a journey to God's heart and his heart is so big and can accommodate all of us.
- * Let us focus on our blessings, and not on what is missing. Never waste your time singing a negative tune, complaining, and grumbling. Choose to be happy. Keep on believing that you are blessed, no matter what.
- * Put your mind on the fact that you have to focus more on the love in your heart rather than on the work of your hands. Do not end up with multiple achievements, titles, possessions, but empty, alone and lonesome deep inside.
- * Focus more on persons than on functions or possessions. Never allow your titles, possessions, and duty to prevent you from being a kind person. The former are all temporary and external. Our character is lasting and eternal.
- * I invite you to pay more attention to what God says and not what other people say about you. Remember, the applause of this world is deceiving, fleeting, and shallow. It is better to earn God's approval, and you will experience a meaningful life, notwithstanding worldly persecutions and rejections.
- Be mindful on depth rather than height because if you aim too high, you may end up living a shallow life filled with pleasure and ego trips.
 It is better to be rooted and live a life that matters.
- * Focus on what you owe the world and not on what the world owes you. Do not let your expectations and entitlement issues rob you of the joy and freedom of living a peaceful and joyful life. Be honest and true to your calling.
- It is better to focus more on the candle glow than on the grind parks and the flashbulbs, and you will cherish quiet, hidden, and refreshing moments. Life is not all about work, nor is it just a show.
- * Finally, focus more on the play button, not on the rewind and the forward buttons. Live in the present reality. Stop regretting the past, worrying about the future. Let us live in God's abundant grace now. Amen.

The reopening of our Church for the weekend Masses is not the easiest thing that has happened. A lot of work, planning, organizing, getting more parishioners who are willing to help, and significant expense. However, we are happy with the results as we were able to build up the faithful's trust and confidence to come back to Church despite the anxiety felt from the pandemic. Let us continue to follow all the mandated protocols and directives from the Bishop and the government, which keep everybody safe, comfortable, and secure at this unprecedented time. We are happy to announce that starting on September 13th, we return to our regular original schedule of weekend Masses. We are going to discontinue the Masses at the Parish Hall. So please try to find your convenient day and time to come to Mass during the weekend. We appreciate your understanding and continued support to the parish as we remind you of your generous monetary contributions to keep the parish holy, vibrant, and alive.





< KD'S> KORNER

Gospel Today | 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time | Mt 18:15-20

Jesus promises, "For where two or three are gathered together in My name, there am I in the midst of them."

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We call God to us when we gather in prayer, two or three or more! Most churches have a "prayer chain". Not a real chain, but a group of people who link up and pray together.

Make a personal prayer chain. Write your thanks, needs, forgiveness or requests to God, one on each link or strip of paper. Attach the links together to form a chain. Have other family members add their own links! Hang it in your home and during family prayer time, as two or three are gathered in Jesus' name, He will hear your prayer. If it is His will, it will be done.

DIRECTIONS -

Step One	Cut the construction paper lengthwise into strips that are about an inch wide. They can be of pretty much any length, keeping in mind that the longer the strip, the bigger each link in the chain. Write your requests to God on each link.
Step Two	Bend the first strip around to form a circle or loop.
Step Three	Seal the open ends of the circle link with glue, tape or a stapler so that it stays connected on its own.
Step Four	Take another strip and thread it through the first loop forming a second, connected circle.
Step Five	Seal the second circle with glue, tape or a stapler so that

you have two linked circles.

Step Six Repeat Steps 4 and 5 to make the chain as long as you like.
