A Message from Fr. Angelito

Dear Friends in Christ,

SOLEMNITY OF CHRIST THE KING

It is difficult to find a more bleak picture of Jesus as King than the one Luke draws in today's Gospel. The throne of Jesus is the cross. His crown made of thorns lets blood flow down his face. His royal investiture is a title nailed above his head stating the cause of his condemnation to death:



"This is the King of the Jews." His two witnesses---his courtiers---are two criminals condemned together with him.

What a great paradox! How can such a person be king? Yes! He is indeed a King. The only real King - the King of Love, according to God's plan.

On the cross, Jesus reveals himself as a King who distributed his gifts most generously:

- The gift of pardon to those who crucified him.
- The gift of heaven to a repentant thief.
- The gift of his mother's love to the whole of humankind.

No earthly king has ever been so glorious on the day of his coronation as Jesus was on the day of his death on the cross. He is a king who gives everything without counting the cost. Are we ready to accept the gifts of pardon and salvation that Jesus, our King, so generously offers?

We need to remember that Christ will not force his gifts on anyone; He leaves each one free to accept or reject him; that is, Jesus does not want to reign by force but through love. The two thieves crucified with Jesus indicate opposite ways humanity responds to God's generosity. One mocks Jesus while the other humbly pleads for mercy and boldly requests: "Jesus, remember me when you come in your kingly power."

Unfortunately, people will always refuse to come under Jesus' loving rule. But happy we shall be if we gladly submit to Jesus' loving reign. Day after day, sharing ever more abundantly his life and love. And getting ready for the moment when at the hour of our death will exult with joy on hearing his words: "Today you shall be with me in paradise (Lk 23:43)." Even before his birth and right through the crucial moments of life and death and after his death, now and forever Jesus is the Lord. This man from Nazareth, this Son of a Carpenter, always had the awareness that he was the Lord and King.

Today, the last Sunday of the Liturgical Year, it is right and just that we honor Christ as our King. For Christ is yesterday and today, the beginning and the end, the Alpha and the Omega; time belongs to him and all the ages. To him be glory and power through every age and forever. To this, we say. Amen. Have a blessed Thanksgiving Day!


Advent Evening Prayer With Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament St. Catherine of Siena Church

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint Cecilia's story, like many of the earliest saints', is largely apocryphal and legendary in nature. According to tradition, Cecilia was born to a wealthy and prominent Roman family. Though she had consecrated her virginity to the Lord, she was married to a man named Valerian. It is said that she was "singing in her heart to the Lord" at her wedding. She confessed her promise of virginity to her new husband revealing that an angel protected her. Valerian would honor her vow only if he too could see the angel. Cecilia told him he would see the angel if he was baptized, which he went to do immediately. When he returned to her, he saw the angel beside her. Cecilia also converted Valerian's brother, Tiburtius.

Unfortunately, it was a turbulent time in Rome for Christians, Valerian and Tiburtius were martyred for burying the bodies of Christians, which was illegal. Cecilia was also targeted for her faith. First authorities attempted to suffocate by locking her in the bath in her home and overheating the room. Some accounts say that she didn't break a sweat and even began to sing. They then sent in an executioner to behead her, but he faltered and was unable to complete his task, only succeeding in mortally wounding her. She remained alive for three days before she died.

The saint's body was exhumed twice, first by Pope Paschal I in 821, then by Cardinal Sfondrato in 1599. Both times her body was found incorrupt, the first saint to exhibit this extremity. St. Cecilia is the patron saint of music and musicians.

Diocese of Trenton Presents Traveling Exhibit—Blessed Carlo Acutis "Cucharistic Miracles" SOVEMBER 6—NOVEMBER 27

St. Catherine of Siena Church

This traveling exhibit by the Diocese of Trenton has been created to assist those who experience it to affirm belief in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. It is based upon the website created by Blessed Carlos Acutis to catalogue all of the eucharistic miracles that have taken place worldwide.

The exhibit is circular and is divided into sections or rooms in which information about the Eucharistic miracles is displayed. Each panel names a miracle, recounts the story of its occurrence and the country where it took place. The panels are arranged in chronological order from the early Third Century to 2013.

Blessed Carlo Acutis died of leukemia in 2006 at the age of 15. Blessed Carlo was a "normal kid" in every way, but also developed a deep devotion to the Holy Eucharist at an early age. He was beatified in 2020, putting him on the path to becoming the first millennial Saint. Earlier this year, Bishop David O'Connell named Blessed Carlo the patron of all Catholic Schools and young people in the Trenton Diocese.

SPONSORS FOR THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM AND CONFIRMATION

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/Letters of Eligibility

In St. Catherine's Parish and in all Catholic Parishes in the U.S.

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

For sponsor requests from St. Catherine', you must be registered at

St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request, showing participation in the life & support of the Church.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago <u>but now</u> <u>lives elsewhere, he/she is not a member of this</u> <u>parish. Rather, he/she is a member of the parish in</u> <u>whose territory he/she resides</u>. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.

It is also necessary for certain benefits and administrative purposes, like scheduling sacraments, obtaining a Sponsor/Godparent Certificate and Letter of Eligibility, and donation statements for your income tax returns. Most importantly, it lets the parish count on you, to call on you to assist in its mission.

Registering in the parish is simple. It just requires signing up, formally enrolling yourself by contacting the Parish Office. Young adults 18 and over who are still living at home with their parents, or attend college, are recommended to register in their own name. Thank You.


