

A Message from Fr. Angelito

Dear Friends in Christ,

Today is World Mission Sunday. Each of us is called to be a missionary, as Jesus has repeatedly told and reminded us in the Gospels. The envelopes we provided mean a lot to the recipients of the mission throughout the whole world. Poverty-stricken countries need our monetary and financial support to alleviate the sufferings and difficulties they are experiencing. THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN THE ORDINARY TIME

Allow me to share with you a lesson I learned from my dog though it was back in the day. One day my dog played mischief—for some reason, I do not remember what--- and I called and reprimanded him. He realized his mistake and, in repentance, spread-eagled himself in front of me, his mouth open and tongue out. I still remember his sad and pathetic look vividly, pleading for pardon. He lay there, a picture of repentance, willing to accept any punishment. With his abject gesture of contrition and humiliation, my dog told me he no longer deserved my love and that he was sorry for what he had done. And this touched and even melted my hard heart.

So, I gently beckoned him to me, and he came slowly, fearfully, tail between his legs. I bent down and tenderly patted him. I could quickly feel life coming back to him: his tail stood erect, he waved it, and his eyes sparkled. Together we had a race in the backyard, and everything was forgiven and forgotten. And we both felt renewed, a deepened relationship instantly cropping up between us.

In this incident, what struck me was my dog's prompt acceptance of his mistake. Animals are simple, sincere, and straightforward. Unlike the Pharisees in today's Gospel, the dog did not play the game of self-righteousness. He knew he had done something wrong and, like the poor, sinful publican, accepted his fault. The moment of a humble admission of faults and failings and gracious forgiveness is a precious sacred moment. Something of the divine, of the transcendent, is injected at this moment into our sinful, sick world. A broken relationship is delicate, though painfully, mended. And there cannot be but peace, and with peace comes joy. Peace and joy are foreign to the proud and the self-righteous fo they are far, very far from the kingdom of God.

The parable of the Pharisee and then the publican is addressed to us personally and as a community. It invites us to examine ourselves in our personal and intimate relationships with God and our neighbor. Let us recognize that we need God. We are sinners, poor, and in need of salvation. He will shower us with mercy if we present our misery to God.

The Pharisee in today's parable is described as standing proudly and conspicuously in the Temple. He is addressing God, but not in supplication. He is telling God how thankful God should be that there are holy men like him on earth! This parable teaches us that it is not enough to pray externally; it is necessary that our prayer penetrates right into the depths of our soul and that it is radically sincere. It should never degrade into an expression of pride in our human perfection and self-congratulation!

Prayer is meant to reach out to God and not remain confined to us. While God disapproves of sin, his mercy and forgiveness are available to all sinners who humbly confess their sinfulness. The proud man will not ask for God's forgiveness and, therefore, will not receive it.

The best prayer is that of loyal, willing service. The humble man who keeps God's commandments willingly out of love for him and does his will daily will have his prayers answered. His loyal service to God is a continual prayer to reach heaven. The prayer of the true lover of God, his humble servant, will be that God's will be done, even if that entails suffering and trails. We would do well to have a close look at our prayer life and what part prayer plays in our life.





SAINT OF THE WEEK


Saint Anthony Mary Claret is also known as the "spiritual father of Cuba." He was born in Salient in Catalonia, Spain, in 1807. He became a weaver, like his father, and was very talented. But he studied in his spare time to become a priest and was ordained in 1835. In 1849 the saint founded the Claretians, a religious institute of missionaries, and a companion order of women religious who served as teachers for girls.

From 1850 to 1857 he served as Archbishop of Santiago de Cuba, Cuba, where he worked diligently to reform both clergy and laity. He opposed concubinage and instructed black slaves, and championed family-owned farms instead of the mass farming of a sugar cash crop. These stances were vehemently opposed by many, and Saint Anthony was the target of assassins.

He was recalled to act as Queen Isabella II's confessor, a duty he reluctantly agreed to, with the exceptions that he would reside away from the court, attending the household only to hear confessions and instruct the children. While in Spain he founded the Religious Publishing House and wrote or published 200 Catholic books and pamphlets. He went into exile to France with the Queen's household during the Spanish Revolution of 1868.

The saint returned to Rome to Participate in Vatican I where he defended the infallibility of the Pope. He died in France in 1870 and was canonized in 1950 by Pope Pius XII.


Liturgical Life

Bishop O'Connell's series on the Eucharist to Jaunch Oct. 18

In a new five-part series on the Eucharist, Bishop David M. O'Connell, C. M., highlights "many aspects of the inexhaustible gift and mystery of the Holy Eucharist as the Body and Blood of the Lord Jesus

Christ drawn from Scripture and Tradition."
Titled "Catechetical Series on the
Eucharist," the segments will begin
Oct. 18, the Feast of St. Luke. An
installment will drop each week
in text, video and podcast across
all diocesan digital platforms.

The entire series will be printed in the November issue of The Monitor Magazine.



The five installments of the series will cover:

Preface and Part One (Oct. 18) • Eucharist as "mystery" and "reality"; faith as a supernatural gift; Jesus' words, "Do this in memory of me," as the institution of the Sacrament of Eucharist

Part Two (Oct. 25) • Catechesis as necessary for belief in the Real Presence of Jesus; Scripture accounts of God's presence among his people

Part Three (Nov. 1) • Excerpts from great theologians, saints, Scripture, emphasizing the unchanging fundamental belief in the Eucharist

Part Four (Nov. 8) • Excerpts from Papal, Vatican II, U.S. Bishop's documents demonstrating continuity and constancy of Eucharistic doctrine

Part Five (Nov. 15) • Eucharistic Lexicon including words, terms and expressions describing or referring to Holy Eucharist or its celebration

SPONSORS FOR THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM AND CONFIRMATION

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/Letters of Eligibility

In St. Catherine's Parish and in all Catholic Parishes in the U.S.

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

For sponsor requests from St. Catherine', you must be registered at

St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request, showing participation in the life & support of the Church.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago but now lives elsewhere, he/she is not a member of this parish. Rather, he/she is a member of the parish in whose territory he/she resides. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.

REASONS WHY TO REGISTER IN THE PARISH

Registration is the official way we join a parish community. Some people think that because they attend a particular parish they automatically belong.

Registration is a commitment to community, a way to be included in the religious, social and ministerial activities of the parish. Registration shows you belong. It is also necessary for certain benefits and administrative purposes, like scheduling sacraments, obtaining a Sponsor/Godparent Certificate and Letter of Eligibility, and donation statements for your income tax returns. Most importantly, it lets the parish count on you, to call on you to assist in its mission.

Registering in the parish is simple. It just requires signing up, formally enrolling yourself by contacting the Parish Office. Young adults 18 and over who are still living at home with their parents, or attend college, are recommended to register in their own name. Thank You.


Discovering the Gospel Message
