A Message from our Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

"Fear not that your life shall come to an end, but rather that it shall never have a beginning" – Cardinal Newman. Strange as it may seem, many of us never choose to live. Just existing or going through the motions of life is not authentic living, still less choosing to live. Today's first reading place before us the option: "Before each person are life and death and whichever one he chooses will be given."

This is a reflection on Deut 30:15: "Today I am giving you a choice between good and evil, between life and death." Deut.30:19 reiterates with an added vital clause: "I am now giving you the choice between life and death, between God's blessing and God's curse." To highlight the seriousness of the choice, God invites, in the very next verse, heaven and earth to witness the choice we make. Without doubt this is the most fundamental choice a person is called to make. Unlike other animals, humans must choose to live, if life must be meaningful. Whatever choice we make will have a vital effect. When we choose life — choose to live authentically — blessings will follow, when we choose death, curses will come upon us.

Choice both postulates and expresses freedom. No freedom means no choice. And every choice is or should be an expression of personal freedom. And because it is an expression of personal freedom, it immediately entails responsibility. With every choice I assume responsibility for my choice and its consequences. Responsible, personal choices are not robotic. They demand reflection; the mind must deliberate dispassionately. Deliberate on what? On what is good and evil. Now, who determines what is good and evil?

With this Old Testament background, we can better understand today's Gospel, which is part of the Beatitudes. Jesus' laws for our happiness and blessedness are aptly called beatitudes. Hence the categorical insistence of Jesus on the validity and the necessity of obeying the Old Testament laws which He came to fulfill, not to abrogate. He stresses on a better, superior, and, specifically, interior adherence to them. The Pharisees and the teachers of the law were satisfied with external compliance. Such an attitude effectively kills the spirit of the law, while it may appear loyal and faithful. It is plain hypocrisy, deceiving and being deceived. It is obeying laws without interiorizing and personalizing them. Such a stance brings no blessings, precisely, because God is here neither worshipped not obeyed.

When a person has reached a deep level of interiorization and personalization of God's word and laws, the only honest stance is of 'Yes' or 'No'. "Anything else you say," adds Jesus authoritatively, "comes from the Evil One." Anything else is either compromise or cowardice or both and maybe something even worse. This can be verified in one's own life. Try it.

Lord God, I thank you for the New Testament and New Testament laws.







Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

During the days and weeks of penance that lie ahead --- from **Ash Wednesday, February 22, 2023, until Holy Thursday morning, April 6, 2023 ---** the Catholic Church throughout the world commemorates the penitential season of Lent ending with the Sacred Triduum of Holy Week. The model Jesus gave us for "these forty days" was his own experience in the desert and the temptations that followed him there where he encountered Satan face to face. And yet, Jesus, there in the desert --- alone, fasting and in intense prayer --- beat back the devil and triumphed over temptation, as strong and as unrelenting as it was throughout those forty days.

We enter the desert of Lent like Jesus, led by the Holy Spirit, to face our devils, our temptations head on. But we are not alone. The Lord Jesus Christ is with us. And so, too, is the Church, the entire community of faith observing Lent. Here is what the Catholic Church in the United States requires of us as baptized Catholics:

The days of FAST (only one full meal) <u>and</u> ABSTINENCE (no meat) are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. No dispensations are granted on these solemn days except for reason of sickness or those provided in canon law below. ALL OTHER FRIDAYS OF LENT are days of ABSTINENCE.

The pastor of a parish has the faculty to give a dispensation to <u>individual</u> parishioners in his parish and the Diocesan Bishop alone has the authority to dispense groups of Catholics but only for a serious reason.

Those who are automatically dispensed from fast and abstinence regulations outside the age limits noted below include: the physically or mentally ill, especially individuals suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes. Also included in the dispensation are women who are pregnant or nursing. In all cases, common sense should prevail, and ill persons should not further jeopardize their health by fasting.

Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to FAST (only one full meal) as above. From the age of 14, people are also obliged to ABSTAIN (no meat): this obligation prohibits the eating of meat, but not eggs, milk products or condiments of any kind, even though made from animal fat).

The obligation to observe the laws of fast and abstinence is a serious one for Catholics. Failure to observe one penitential day in itself is not considered a serious sin. It is the intentional failure to observe any penitential days at all, or a substantial number of penitential days, that must be considered a serious matter.

The obligation, the privilege really, of receiving the Eucharist at least once a year --- often called "Easter duty" --- for those in the state of grace should still be fulfilled during the period from the **First Sunday of Lent, February 25-26, 2023, to Trinity Sunday, June 3-4, 2023.** However, the Church's law does permit this precept to be fulfilled at another time during the year when there is a just cause.

I want to encourage all Catholics, especially those who are conscious of serious sin, to go to confession and to make use of the sacrifices and traditions that have always been part of our Lenten practices in the Church.

We do, indeed, fast and pray with the Lord Jesus and with our fellow Catholics. May this Lent be a time of penance leading to grace and joy for us all at Easter.

SPONSORSHIP FOR THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM AND CONFIRMATION

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/Letters of Eligibility

In St. Catherine's Parish and in all Catholic Parishes in the U.S.

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

For sponsor requests from St. Catherine's, you must be registered at St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request, showing participation in the life & support of the Church.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago <u>but</u> <u>now lives elsewhere, he/she is not a member of</u> <u>this parish.</u>

Rather, he/she is a member of the parish in whose territory he/she resides. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.
