


A Message from our Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"Blessed are the poor," Jesus tells us today. Who was blessed, the beggar without the gold coin but at peace with God, or the rich man with the gold coin lacking peace with God?

Happiness, real happiness — all of us long for it and seek it. But is it possible for us to find it in this world? If it is possible, where should we



look for it? Some say, "How can we even think of happiness or speak of it when the social situation is so bad? When we are daily bombarded with news such as crimes, violence, rapes, diseases, disasters, murders, robberies, wars, corruption, exploitation, etc., is it not ridiculous to speak of happiness?"

Yet, the search continues. The only mistake is that many look for it in the wrong things, places, and persons. No wonder many seek happiness in security, fun, popularity, sex, power, comforts, drugs, etc. Finally, all such people end up in a state of permanent unhappiness and prove that the search for happiness in these things is useless. They realize that living like animals according to base instincts results in wretchedness and despair.

When Jesus Christ went up on the mountain and taught his disciples the 'Beatitudes,' was the social situation any better than what we experience today? Jesus knew very well that it was indeed terrible. If we examine the Gospels and listen to what he says, we see that the social situation at that time was no better than our present one.

He tells people, "The king is an immoral man; the tax collectors and administrators are corrupt; men are adulterers — the whole lot of them (they all left when He said, "If any of you is without sin, let him stay"). His best friend John was in jail; the shepherds were hirelings and mercenaries.

Housewives were losing their money; children were neglected, scandalized, sick or dead; occupying forces were murdering people in the temple; priests were hypocrites. The disciples were without understanding; Judas was a traitor; the only tower mentioned fell, killing many people; sons were lost; sheep were in the wilderness; and finally, he was about to be arrested and killed.

Jesus gave his disciples a compact summary of the rules for happiness in the Beatitudes. It is profound but simple, and it is eminently practical. Jesus never meant that being poor, weeping, and persecuted are good things. He wants all human beings to do their best to be free from poverty and obtain the necessity of things in life.

Yet Jesus greatly loved the poor and insisted that to be poor is essential to enter his kingdom. When one is poor, one is much more prepared to put one's trust in God, making it easy for God to save that person. In the estimation of Jesus, one is poor and puts his trust in God alone, not in his wealth or other human resources. Jesus has pointed out the source of our happiness — God, and the way to find him is by putting our whole trust in him.

Lord Jesus, thank you for giving me the laws for true and lasting happiness. Please give me the wisdom to appreciate and apply them in my daily life. Amen.



Inspiration for the Week

Every day, God offers each of us countless opportunities to embody the Beatitudes. Blink and you might miss them. Where is God inviting you to poverty of spirit? Where does he beg you to hunger for righteousness? How does he ask you to make peace?



WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Question:

What is the difference between a "Saint" and a "Blessed"?

Answer:

The process of proclaiming someone as a saint in the Catholic Church has evolved over the course of many centuries. In the beginning, those honored as saints were almost exclusively biblical figures or martyrs. However, after the legalization of Christianity in the fourth century, new holy women and men came to be honored as saints, and this was often done by popular acclaim or by the local bishop or abbot.

It was Pope Gregory IX (who was pope from 1227 to 1241) who officially proclaimed that only the pope had the authority to add someone to the official list (the "canon") of saints. This is the meaning of the word "canonization."

Today, the saint-making process includes several steps, including detailed studies of the person's life and a recognition that they died as a martyr or lived a life of "heroic virtue." Once someone is recognized as a martyr or if a miracle is attributed to their intercession, they will be beatified and honored as "Blessed." This means that they can be celebrated by Catholics in a particular country or region or by the members of certain religious community. If another miracle occurs and is approved, then the "Blessed" is canonized and honored with the title "Saint," meaning that they are now officially recognized as a universal model of holiness and an intercessor.

Our Parish Family

Parish Registration

Question:

Why is it so important that we register in a parish? Isn't it good enough that we go to Mass?

Answer:

Registration is the official way we join a parish community. Many people think that because they attend a particular parish they automatically belong. At times, young adults who have moved away for years think they are parents. But still signed up under their membership requires signing up, formally enrolling yourself in a parish.

Registration is a commitment to a community, a way to be included in the religious, social, and ministerial activities of your parish. Your registration affects the parish in many ways. Census numbers can determine how many priests are assigned to a church, what benefits and obligations the community has to the diocese, and how Masses, Confessions, and devotions are planned and scheduled.

Registration shows you belong. It is also necessary for certain benefits, like scheduling sacraments, obtaining sponsor certificates, and getting donation statements for taxes. Most importantly, it lets the parish count on you, to call on you to assist in its mission. Registering in your parish is a statement of faith and confidence in the life and work of your parish.

SPONSORSHIP FOR THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM AND CONFIRMATION

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/Letters of Eligibility

In St. Catherine's Parish and in all Catholic Parishes in the U.S.

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

For sponsor requests from St. Catherine's, you must be registered at St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request, showing participation in the life & support of the Church.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago <u>but</u> <u>now lives elsewhere, he/she is not a member of</u> <u>this parish.</u>

Rather, he/she is a member of the parish in whose territory he/she resides. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.

First-time parents are required to attend a Baptismal Preparation Class prior to scheduling the Baptism.


