

A Message from our Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

The beginning of the season of Lent is on ASH Gospel reading.

WEDNESDAY, February 14. Not a holy day of obligation, however there are important reasons why we must come to Church either by attending the Holy Mass or the Prayer Service. Also receiving the ashes as the minister is saying the formula while they impose the ashes on our forehead: "Repent and believe in the Gospel or Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." As Roman Catholics, it has been our strong tradition to come to together in the worship place as we start the holy season of Lent and together with Jesus and the whole universal Church manifest our willingness and be able prepare for the holiest days of the week. Take note of the discipline for Lent and the Holy Week as our Bishop has given for our faithful guidance.

Also, please keep in mind that we have collections for Ash Wednesday and the proceeds goes to our in-house-ministry for the poor and the less fortunate, The Good Samaritan Ministry of St. Catherine. Let us be generous as we express in words and deeds our sympathy, compassion and care for the needy and the under privilege. Thank you so much.

Every Friday during Lent the parish has Stations of the Cross in the Church that starts at 6 PM. Following the prayers, all are invited to join us for supper in soup the Parish Hall this Friday, February 16. A wonderful opportunity for us to be together, camaraderie and fellowship, hence come and eat and have some light conversations, there is chance to meet our new parishioners, let us be friendly and give them a warm welcome.

As we reflect on the word today, there is a striking contrast between what happens to a person with leprosy in the 1st reading and what happens in the Father Angelito



In the 1st reading, from the Book of

Leviticus, the role of the priest is simply to identify the disease so that the leper can be declared "unclean"—which means ritually impure and thus excluded from the worship of God. The afflicted person must "dwell apart, making his abode outside the camp." Not simply out of fear of contagion, but because his affliction does not fit with the ideal of purity that is thought to befit those who worship of the God of Israel.

In the Gospel, however, Jesus does not simply identify impurity but becomes himself the source of purity. The leper comes to Jesus with the faith that, unlike the priests, Jesus has the power to make him clean, to reintegrate him into the community of Israel. Indeed, in telling the man to go and show himself to the priests, Jesus seems to reaffirm the role of priests as those who can identify purity and impurity, but he gives to himself a much higher role: he is the one who bestows wholeness and healing that makes it possible to be a part of God's people.

In the sacrament of Baptism, Jesus does for us what he does for the man in the Gospel: we are healed of our spiritual infirmities so that we can become a part of the community of those who worship God. To each of us who ask him for cleansing from sin he says, "I do will it. Be made clean."

Jesus, source of compassionate healing, we ask you to make us whole in body and in spirit, so that we might offer ourselves as a worthy gift to God. Amen.

SPONSORSHIP FOR THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM AND CONFIRMATION

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/Letters of Eligibility

In St. Catherine's Parish and in all Catholic Parishes in the U.S.

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

For sponsor requests from St. Catherine's, you must be registered at St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request, showing participation in the life & support of

the Church.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago **but now lives elsewhere, he/she is not a member of** <u>this parish.</u>

Rather, he/she is a member of the parish in whose territory he/she resides. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.

First-time parents are required to attend a Baptismal Preparation Class prior to scheduling the Baptism.

Godparents are required to provide Sponsor Certificates before a Baptismal date is given.

Please call the Parish Office to order. Flower orders are not permitted during Lent.





LENTEN REGULATIONS



Office of the Bishop January 23, 2024

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

During the days and weeks of penance that lie ahead --- from **Ash Wednesday, February 14, 2024, until Holy Thursday morning, March 28, 2024 ---** the Catholic Church throughout the world commemorates the penitential season of Lent ending with the Sacred Triduum of Holy Week. The model Jesus gave us for "these forty days" was his own experience in the desert and the temptations that followed him there where he encountered Satan face to face. And yet, Jesus, there in the desert --- alone, fasting and in intense prayer --- beat back the devil and triumphed over temptation, as strong and as unrelenting as it was throughout those forty days.

We enter the desert of Lent like Jesus, led by the Holy Spirit, to face our devils, our temptations head on. But we are not alone. The Lord Jesus Christ is with us. And so, too, is the Church, the entire community of faith observing Lent. Here is what the Catholic Church in the United States requires of us as baptized Catholics:

The days of FAST (only one full meal) <u>and</u> ABSTINENCE (no meat) are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. No dispensations are granted on these solemn days except for reason of sickness or those provided in canon law below. ALL OTHER FRIDAYS OF LENT are days of ABSTINENCE.

The pastor of a parish has the faculty to give a dispensation to <u>individual</u> parishioners in his parish and the Diocesan Bishop alone has the authority to dispense groups of Catholics but only for a serious reason.

Those who are automatically dispensed from fast and abstinence regulations outside the age limits noted below include: the physically or mentally ill, especially individuals suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes. Also included in the dispensation are women who are pregnant or nursing. In all cases, common sense should prevail, and ill persons should not further jeopardize their health by fasting.

Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to FAST (only one full meal) as noted above. From the age of 14, people are also obliged to ABSTAIN: this obligation prohibits the eating of meat, but not eggs, milk products or condiments of any kind, even though made from animal fat.

The obligation to observe the laws of fast and abstinence is a serious one for Catholics. Failure to observe one penitential day in itself is not considered a serious sin. It is the intentional failure to observe any penitential days at all, or a substantial number of penitential days, that must be considered a serious matter.

The obligation, the privilege really, of receiving the Eucharist at least once a year --- often called "Easter duty" --for those in the state of grace should still be fulfilled during the period from the First Sunday of Lent, February 17-18, 2024, to Trinity Sunday, May 25-26, 2024. However, the Church's law does permit this precept to be fulfilled at another time during the year when there is a just cause.

I want to encourage all Catholics, especially those who are conscious of serious sin, to go to Confession and to make use of the sacrifices and traditions that have always been part of our Lenten practices in the Church.

We do, indeed, fast and pray with the Lord Jesus and with our fellow Catholics. May this Lent be a time of Penance leading to grace and joy for us all at Easter.




